Meet Florian Kielich, a daily "guest" at St. Ann Center since 2002. He was born in Milwaukee on February 28, 1935, the oldest of three children. His parents were Erwin and Regina who are both deceased. His younger brother and caregiver, John, lives in Milwaukee and their younger sister Theresa lives in Lake Orion, Michigan with her family.

Florian was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy at birth. As a youth he attended Frederick J. Gaenslen School, where he completed his formal education through the 9th grade. This Milwaukee Public School on 1250 East Burleigh Street (equipped for students with severe special need)s, provides extended day activities, and also offers day care on non-school days.

Florian has always been an avid fan of auto racing. When he and John were young lads, they would go to State Fair Park to see the midget car races. Florian would cut out every article in the local papers about racing and paste them into a scrapbook. Eventually, his father was able to secure a job as a ticket taker at the park, and Florian would attend all of the races. His father held this position for almost 50 years and Florian "tagged" along. As a result, even till this day, Florian knows a lot of the vendors at the park and they always enjoy seeing him during State Fair week. He doesn't attend any races these days, but is still an avid TV fan of the sport.

He also enjoys attending Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra POPS concerts and the various ethnic festivals in the summertime.

Florian continued to live with his father, after his mother died, until his father's death in 2001. At that time, Florian came to live with his brother until 2009. He now resides at Brown Deer Manor.

Florian's commitment to prayer is an inspiration. He truly fulfills Saint Paul's request to the Ephesians to "pray constantly." As was noted earlier, he is an avid fan of racing, but it is now limited to TV events. However, these take a back seat to EWTN programming. Florian usually wakes to early morning Mass, then prays the rosary and Divine Mercy chaplet in the afternoon (when he's not attending the center) and then follows EWTN's evening Mass. He also watches many of their special programming events, i.e., Vatican Masses, papal trips, etc. In addition, he uses his personal prayer book for reciting his daily prayers which include the Stations of the Cross (14 biblical meditations that follow the passion and death of Jesus). Florian might not realize it but he is a great gift to St. Ann Center.

A Message From Our President

Dear Friends,

I would like to take this opportunity to give you an end of the year update regarding the various movements here at St. Ann Center for Intergenerational Care.

In order to continue meeting the needs of the older adults who want to stay in their own homes we have decided to add a second floor patio. This will allow expanded dining space in a garden atmosphere.

In child care we are developing an intergenerational curriculum to give children an ever-increasing opportunity for enrichment in their young lives. We are also working to certify our day care through the Young Star Program (see the article on page 3).

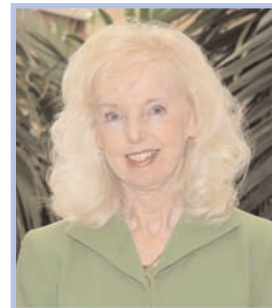
With regard to our global intergenerational outreach we are successfully placing animals in the hands of elderly people in 19 communities in Cameroon Africa. These grandparents are caring for grandchildren whose parents have died from HIV/AIDS or Malaria. Several of our staff just returned after 13 days of working on this thriving endeavor to improve the lives of these children and their grandparents.

Due to the graciousness of our city planners we have been given several acres of land between 24th and 25th Streets on the north side of North Avenue. We are planning to replicate St. Ann Center at that new location, thus responding to the need for community based dementia care and quality education for children in their preschool years.

Our Outpatient Rehabilitation department has a new space in the Weinberg Building. We also have relocated Shepherd House (our dementia care unit) to its new home in the same building where it includes a beautiful comfort room.

Every day we are in awe of the value of this intergenerational model because we see children who grow in trust and older adults whose lives are transformed and enriched. I would like to extend a thank you to all of our donors, parents, and other caregivers as we complete another eventful year. *"Coming together is a beginning; keeping together is progress; working together is success"* Henry Ford.

All centers are rated on a "star scale" with stars ranging from 1 to 5 stars. Young Star will evaluate our center in July 2012 and then grant our star(s). From now until then, our child care director, Kathy Aderhold and assistant director, Shelly Reynolds, will be working to help St. Ann Center become as ready as possible for Young Star. They will work with people that will help organize the classrooms, develop our unique intergenerational curriculum for ages 6 weeks and up, create the children's portfolios



to follow their progress in each classroom, become accredited, as well as assist the staff in getting more education than they already have. With this being said, Young Star also wants more parent involvement. This means that Kathy and Shelly will be having more parent meetings and classrooms will be having parent/teacher conferences. CAMEROON OUTREACH

From October 25 to November 6, a group of happy and excited people departed from St. Ann Center for Cameroon, a developing country in west



Africa. The delegation of eight, included Sr. Edna, three St. Ann Center staff members Chris Jackson, Jackie Williams, Yolanda Jones, and four people from the local community: Lisa and Swee Sim (Milwaukee), Fr. Byron Haaland (Hales Corners) and Karen Stardy (Union Grove).



Their final destination was the missions operated by the Tertiary Sisters of St. Francis, members of the "common venture" which also includes the Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi (St. Francis, WI), Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration (La Crosse, WI) and the Eucharistic Sisters (Meriden, CT).

"The sisters there do incredible things with barely nothing" said Chris Jackson who helped to construct the goat barn as part of the "goats and chicken" project that affords people a way to make a living.



Swee and Lisa Sim installed solar panels on the compound, Fr. Byron shared spiritual reflection and prayer with the Sisters and Karen Stardy brought her expertise as a Wisconsin goat farmer (BSW Farm).

"I was impressed with how happy and grateful the people and sisters are, how many lives have changed just because of the goats and chickens project" Yolanda Jones. Yolanda taught donut making as a way for local people to make a living.



Jackie Williams noted: "As a black woman I was very impressed to see so many black Sisters, and that the country is 70% Catholic. The people were so respectful. It truly was a spiritual retreat."

"I went to be inspired and I was not disappointed" said Sr. Edna when she returned home.

This results in successful goal achievement, again and again! While the 88 degree water automatically relaxes the body, it ultimately assists in relaxing the mind and spirit as well.

Susan Gock, a Center client who suffered a brain aneurysm has been using the pool once a week. She swims 1 on 1 with Jennifer who says she has seen major improvement with her stability, especially when walking.

Get Healthy - Get a Massage

When your life is filled with stress, your body will send warning signals that something is out of balance. You may experience tense shoulder muscles, sweaty palms, fingernail biting or excessive talking. If that doesn't get your attention, and you don't remove the cause of the stress, your body will shout louder in the form of headaches, fatigue, ulcers, insomnia, irritability or more serious problems. If you don't listen to your body's signals, your body will create bigger and bigger problems until you do pay attention. Ways to prevent these problems include: taking a walk, learn how to do breathing exercises, joining yoga or low impact aerobic classes, swimming, having a massage or acupuncture session, or having lunch with a friend. (All of these are factors that contribute to increased falls among the elderly). The weightlessness of water provides much needed relief to joints that may be affected by arthritis, an injury, or even a major surgery, recent or past. The still-growing bodies of children able-bodied as well as the disabled bodies of every age, can benefit immensely from the resistance-training that water offers. Water helps build strength and stability in bones and muscles, preventing atrophy for those in wheelchairs, and providing core strength and coordination for those who are still walking on their own.

- **Learn-to-Swim Classes (Levels 1 - 4)*** teach persons of all ages the fundamentals of swimming including 7 different strokes and water safety and survival. Class size is arranged by age and ability. Classes may be combined or cancelled based on enrollment. Class length is 45 minutes and costs \$50 per session.

- **Private Lessons** are adaptive personalized private lessons available for those that need one-on-one learning time beginning at 3 years old. Classes can begin anytime, please call to schedule your 8 week private swim lesson.

Class length is 30 minutes and costs \$80. for eight weeks.

- **Open Swim** is available for anyone in the community. Times are Monday - Friday, 7:30 a.m. - 8:45 a.m., 12:00 p.m. - 1:00 p.m., or 3:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Cost is \$5/person per open swim time; pay as you come.

Friday Night Open Swim. Friday Night is Family Night! Don't get a sitter! Spend Friday night WITH your kids. Come and play in our pool. Friday Night, 6:00 p.m. - 7:30 p.m. Cost is \$5 per person (2 + under free). Please enter using the aquatic doors on the west side of building.

- **Warm Water Movement** - Monday, Wednesday & Friday, 1:00 p.m. - 1:45 p.m. Cost is \$5 per class. Gentler and slower than traditional aerobics, the movements focus on increasing flexibility and mobility of persons with arthritis. They target a complete range of muscles and joints. Perfect for those recovering from joint or back injuries, surgery or illness.

- **High Energy Water Aerobics** - Tuesday & Thursday 5:45 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. Cost is \$5 per class. This class will work your muscles at an invigorating pace that raises the heart rate, but is comfortable; it will leave you feeling good about yourself and full of energy.

- **Low Impact Water Aerobics** - 2:45 p.m. Tuesday & Thursday 7:00 p.m. - 7:45 p.m. This class can improve flexibility, stretching and bone density, as well as tone the muscles of your body.

- **Arthritis Foundation Aquatic Program** - Thursday, 2:00 p.m. - 2:45 p.m.
